

Labor Day (September 2), which is always observed on the first Monday in September, marks the unofficial end of summer and the start of the fall season. # **COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT** WHAT IS 988 DAY? NO JUDGMENT. JUST HELP!

With rising levels of anxiety, depression, emotional distress and overdose deaths, it is crucial that people have somewhere to turn when they're in crisis. Suicide is a leading cause of death in the United States. The number of people with a substance use disorder continues to increase. The 988 Lifeline, directly connects to immediate and free support and resources for anyone in crisis. It was established to improve access to immediate support to meet the nation's growing mental health, suicide and substance use distress needs. It provides easy access to emotional distress care, which is distinct from 911, where the focus is on dispatching emergency medical services, fire and police as needed.

SAMHSA (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration) is asking individuals and organizations to use the #988day so they can build a media wall with all the community support.

On Sunday, September 8, help spread the message "No Judgment. Just Help." 988 Day is a national initiative dedicated to raising awareness about the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline and emphasizing the importance of mental health and suicide prevention. Use the hashtag #988day to share your activities and how you're promoting awareness of 988.

When someone contacts the 988 Lifeline, they do not have to say who they are or where they are to get support. The 988 Lifeline crisis counselor only knows the person's phone number if they call or text or their IP address if they use chat. No one is required to provide any personal information to receive help from the 988 Lifeline.

Simply calling, texting 988 or chatting **988lifeline.org** will connect a person in crisis to compassionate care and support for any mental health or substance use-related distress. About 98% of people who call, chat or text the 988 Lifeline get the crisis support they need and do not require additional services at that moment. It is a key part of a broader vision for reimagined crisis care in the United States.

### **Urgent Realities**

A person dies by suicide every 11 minutes

### In 2022:

-- The number of suicides was the highest number ever recorded in the U.S. -- Over 950,000 youth. and 1.6 million adults attempted suicide.

-- 12.3% of Asian youth 12.6% of Latino youth

12.2% of Black youth and 15.2% of multiracial youth had serious thoughts of suicide, made suicide plans or attempted suicide in the past year.

-- Nearly 108,000 people died from a drug overdose.





The toolkit's objective is to fire up the suicide prevention and mental health community around a central message and call to action to promote the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline. It includes a variety of assets and guidelines to help partners, grantees, crisis centers and community leaders effectively engage their audiences and amplify the message of "No Judgment. Just Help."

Through federal, state local and community partnerships, SAMHSA is working towards a vision where everyone has:

### Someone to talk to. Someone to respond. A safe place for help.




### FIRST FRIDAY ART WALK RETURNS SEPT. 6

### PASTOR LUIS DE JESUS IS ON A MISSION FOR GOD! SO GET



In October 2009, a youth group passionate about God in New York City saw an Atheist advertisement campaign in their subway system, which stated: "A Million New Yorkers Are Good Without God. Are You?"

They were so stirred up by it that they went to their Youth Pastor who then went to his network of Youth Pastors/leaders to ask "What are we, as the body of Christ going to do about this?" According to https://godbelongsinmycity.com/about-gbimc, they prayed and decided to take action and have Youth Ministries from all around the five boroughs hold a prayer walk wearing a simple T-shirt, that stated "God Belongs in My City."

Less than two weeks later, on November 14, 2009, over 1,500 youth walked from North and South of Manhattan meeting at Times Square and Grand Central Station making a bold statement that made history in the city and now the nation. Will your city be next?

Pastor Luis De Jesus The answer was yes! After Pastor Luis De Jesus attended a Prayer Walk in Jacksonville, FL,

he was motivated to start one in Ocala in 2012. More than 4,000 people participated. De Jesus held a walk every year until 2017. His son was killed a week later, during Labor Day weekend, in Reading, Pa. Tragedy struck again after his son's death when six more members of his family died.

"As a pastor, I did all the funerals, but there came a point in my life where I was filling the void of all my lost relatives and functioning as a pastor, but mentally, physically and spiritually was overwhelmed," he said.

It was too much for De Jesus, who has always stood in the gap and taken care of everyone else. The stress made him very sick, psoriasis plagued his body and his weight ballooned to 300 pounds, which led to Psoriatic Arthritis and cancer in his right kidney. He realized he needed help and moved back to New York in 2017.

De Jesus accepted Jesus as his Savior in 1993. He was 25 years old. Although he grew up in an unstable and abusive environment with drug-addicted parents, he said he was saved from the streets, drugs and alcohol addiction.

"It took me seven years to come back to Ocala and renew the prayer walk this time around and we are here to stay no matter what storms come our way," he said.

De Jesus is bringing back the God Belongs in My City Ocala Prayer Walk on Saturday, September 7. The 2.2 mile walk starts at the Veterans Memorial Park, 2625 E. Fort King St., at 8 a.m., and at 9 a.m., attendees start walking "As One" down the sidewalks on Silver Springs Blvd. (SR 40) to Citizen's Circle. The walk includes worship by Rooms Living, prayers by pastors and community leaders and ministry tables, which were added this year. Nearly 2,000 people are expected to attend this year.

"I feel that God is in our city, but there are also many issues that need to be addressed," De Jesus said. "We have the largest youth correctional facilities in the United States for ages 14 to 21, and no programs such as trades, biblical education and mentorship so they can excel as they come back to society."

God Belongs in Ocala was founded with a simple yet powerful vision: to bring people together in faith and create a sense of belonging in the community. It began with a small group of dedicated individuals who wanted to make a difference in Ocala through prayer and community service.



"Registration is not required, just show up with a humble heart and be ready to pray for our city," De Jesus said. "The biggest impact and difference that the prayer walk has done for Ocala is to wake up the community of believers to come together, putting aside denominational barriers and work as one for our community."

Cynthia Irving said it's been a long time since she participated in the prayer walk. She said she plans to attend this year because it was amazing to be surrounded by other believers.

"I want to spread the good news and the gospel to anyone who might see us walking," Irving said.

DeJesus, chairman of God Belongs In My City Florida Inc., said although the event is a national event, they incorporated it to cover the whole state of Florida with prayer walks. He said since he's been gone for seven years, support for the walk hasn't been the same.

They still need sponsors and would love for businesses on the walk route to donate sneakers, electronics and clothing for the youth. De Jesus said if he had a sponsor, he would give everyone a free T-shirt, but the income from the T-shirts helped him pay for the insurance, park permits and other expenses.

De Jesus said God Belongs in My City Florida Inc., has an account at TD Bank or donations can be made via Paypal, Zelle or Cash App.

Eventually, he wants to get everyone together and go to Tallahassee, but his long-term vision is to hold a prayer walk twice a year with activities for the whole family. De Jesus said visitors already come to Ocala to see what they're doing so they can do the same in their city.

"We want to open an Ocala Prayer Center to pray for the needs of our community and train others to establish prayer walks in other cities," he said. "I feel Ocala is the hub for spirituality and a beacon of hope for the whole state. We are the limelight of Florida."

# MONEY SMART TIPS

### A BARGAIN IS ONLY GOOD IF YOU USE IT!



When looking to save money one place to examine is how many paid subscriptions or memberships you have. A neighbor of mine joined a gym and drove by it three times a week while doing errands. He never once went inside even though he paid that membership monthly for two and a half years. I like reading magazines so when I get a great

offer, like \$10 or \$12 for the entire year, I sometimes sign up. Months later I realized I never read those magazines, even though I thought I wanted to, so it's money totally wasted. My favorite Money Expert, Clark Howard, shared a report from *Self Financial* which stated that 85.7% of streaming services subscriptions go unused every month with an average waste of money of \$32.84 per month. There is only so much television that you can watch and many of us have multiple streaming services. They make one interesting suggestion of switching services every month. Binge watch the shows you like that are only on one service then switch to another service to do the same thing. The leading cause for continuing to pay for services/subscriptions you don't want is automatic renewal. To prevent this, most services allow you to manage your account online and you can turn off the automatic renewal feature. Stop reading this article and do it right now so you don't forget!

Last week I had to do the somewhat painful task of shopping for new automobile

and homeowners insurance. I have written before about how important it is to comparison shop and searching for new insurance truly reinforced this. When comparing the same exact coverage from three different name brand companies; it was shocking to discover that another company's quote was \$1,000 cheaper than my current




company for a year and was \$2,000 less expensive than another well-known company, all three with the same coverage. I would tell you which company saved me money but everyone's situation is so unique with coverage you just need to make these calls yourself.

According to the *Kiplinger Retirement Report*, you should file an appeal if a Medicare Advantage Plan turns you down for medically necessary care. They looked at government statistics and found that 75% of the appeals were granted to those who applied. Well worth your time and effort. Medicare Advantage members only have 60 days from the date of the denial to file an appeal which will require a letter from your doctor explaining why you need the care. Follow all the directions on the denial notice and if you need help you can call the State Health Insurance Assistance Programs office at (877) 839-2675 or the Medicare Rights Center at (800) 333-4114. If you receive a surprise medical bill, you can contact the federal No Surprises Help Desk at (800) 985-3059 or submit a complaint online at cms.gov/medical-bill-rights.


