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
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

COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT COMMUNITY WITH A HEART PROGRAM OPENS SOON

We're starting this year's campaign with heavy hearts because we had to say goodbye to two of our board members that sadly passed away this year. Tamara Upshaw and Patti Lumpkin. They will forever be in our hearts and remembered for their tireless efforts in assisting families in our community.

Need help catching up on your rent or mortgage payments? Your car broke down and you don't have the money to repair it? Something unexpected happened and you just need a little help getting back on your feet? Community With A Heart (CWAH) might be an option, if you qualify.



Applicants seeking help from the program must provide all the required documentation, agree to a

home visit and be able to pay the difference if the amount of the request is more than \$1,200. Some requests, such as car repairs, will require two estimates.

For the past 38 years, the CWAH program, totally supported by donations from the community, has been a lifeline for many, and in some cases, the only option available to help families get back on their feet after experiencing a major unexpected life event.

"I have represented Community Legal Services on the Board of CWAH for over 20 years," said Lena Hopkins, Senior Manager of Pro Bono Services for Community Legal Services. "CWAH has been a lifeline for many of our clients, whose legal issues are due to loss of income or some other life changing event. The program has provided rental and mortgage assistance, helping our clients to avoid evictions and foreclosure."

The Star-Banner initially organized the annual campaign in 1986 to bring together social service and charitable agencies to assist those in need. In 2012, control of the program was passed to the agencies that served on the board.

The CWAH board meets weekly beginning the second week in November to discuss requests for assistance and allocate funds. The holiday program runs through mid-January. Assistance is capped at \$1,200 per request, and individuals do not receive any money directly. All payments are made on their behalf, and if approved, applicants can not apply again for three years.

"It's a hand up, not a hand out," Hopkins said.

How to apply for assistance from CWAH:

To seek help from CWAH, individuals should contact one of the following agencies for a referral to see if they qualify for assistance from the program: Marion County Children's Alliance, Interfaith Emergency Services, Marion County School Social Services, Brother's Keeper, Community Legal Services of Mid-Florida, Ocala Housing Authority, Isaiah Foundation, Central Florida Community Action Agency, Marion County Community Services, Habitat for Humanity and Cleve Butler and James Jackson, Community -at-Large Members.

Now in its 38th season, CWAH has collected more than \$1.8 million, of which \$30,04.61 was raised during the 2023 - 2024 campaign to help those in need in Marion County.





CUMMINGS TO BE INSTALLED AS MODERATOR

Rev. Eric Cummings always knew he would be a pastor although his desire was to be an attorney first. Cummings, pastor of New Zion Missionary Baptist Church, knew he was called to preach when he was 15 years old, but it took 19 years before he accepted the call.

On Sunday, December 1, when Cummings is installed as the new Moderator of the Second Bethlehem Baptist Association (SBBA), another call on his life will be fulfilled.

Several years ago, Cummings said Sister Myrna Myles, the Women's Auxiliary President, pulled him, Rev. Keith Blunt and Rev. Standley Gillings aside and told them that one day they all would be Moderators in the SBBA.

"We thanked her for seeing that in us but kind of dismissed it because we were all so close in age and we were not going to run against each other because chronologically, it could be 20 plus years before we could all be Moderators without running against each other."

But when Rev. Jerone Gamble had to step down due to term limits implemented under his administration, Gillings and Cummings pushed Blunt to run for the position. In 2022, Blunt was elected and chose Gillings to be Vice Moderator at Large, meaning he would be the next person in line for the office. Blunt served until he died in 2023. Gillings became Moderator, but he told Cummings he would only serve until the next election and encouraged him to run. Cummings ran and was recently elected.



"This was truly God's doing," he said. "Sister Myles's prophetic word came to fruition."

Cummings started preaching in 2003. In 2007, he became pastor of Union Missionary Baptist Church, Dunnellon, FL., before returning to his home church, New Zion Missionary Baptist Church, in 2016. He serves as the Basileus of the Psi Chi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity; Director of Religious Affairs for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP); Fourth Vice President of the Florida General Baptist Convention Congress of Christian Education; and is a Founding Member and Executive Secretary of Pastors With A Purpose Ministerial Alliance.

Cummings top priorities are to reach out to those churches who down through the years left the Association for one reason or another and encourage them to come back and join them in this kingdom-building assignment. He also wants the Association to be more involved and visible doing more things in the community while evangelizing and reaching out to those who may not know Christ.

"There are currently 43 active churches in Second Bethlehem," he said. "I know of 19 churches that were once a part of Second Bethlehem whom I'm praying will come back to be a part of this great movement."

Cummings believes his greatest challenge will be respecting and honoring the legacy and traditions of the pioneers while implementing new ideas and change. He said some may be so entrenched in traditionalism that they won't be receptive to positive change.

"There is a demographic of people that is absent from the church in large numbers, and that is those who are 18 - 45 years old. Ironically, this is the same demographic that don't vote consistently and are not concerned about a lot of societal issues," he said. "Many have been reared in the church but when they matured, they didn't see a need to keep worshiping or serving like their parents and grandparents did."

Cummings, who also serves on the Marion County School Board, said he's ready for the challenge, but he wants to hear from young people. He said Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me," is his favorite scripture because it lets him know that God empowers him to do the work that he does and that the gifts God has enshrined in him are to be used for kingdom building work, not for self-gain or promotion, but for kingdom building.

"I want to hear the young perspective and give them a seat at the table. To involve them in church by not shunning or stifling their ideas, but giving them opportunities to exercise their gifts," he said, "We also need to allow the young people to express themselves and grow their relationship with God."

"We still keep in contact and I visit him and Millie a couple times a month to play

challenges of being a single parent to an analysis of today's toughest issues. Since 2020, there have been 1088 episodes.

Carelock said McLean chose the name, "The Bible Speaks," in an effort to bring the word of God to the world through spoken words.

"The overall goal of the podcast is to help people understand how to implement what they are reading in the Word of God with practical steps or points of view." he said.

Topics for the podcast are selected mainly through divine inspiration, but Carelock also uses current events or things that are relevant to our communities. Guest speakers are people who are steeped in the word of God and teach on a regular basis.

Even Carelock has applied some of the discussions from past speakers to his daily life. He said in one conversation with Dr. O, they discussed preparing for what's next and she gave great insight on how we

sometimes miss opportunities because we allow things from our past to keep us from recognizing new opportunities.

"There is no end to the knowledge we can obtain," Carelock said. "The Bible has the answer to every problem we face."

NEW HELP CENTER OPENING TO ASSIST THE HOMELESS

It took five years, but Karla Greenway's dream of having a facility to help people in our community who are homeless has finally come true.

Greenway, CEO of Interfaith Emergency Services, got the idea after two studies were done in Marion County in 2019 to determine how to address the community's homeless population. The studies completed by the Public Policy Institute and the Florida Housing Coalition both stated there needed to be a central point of access for individuals experiencing homelessness to receive services.

"Because Interfaith already provided many of the basic needs for this population on our campus (food, showers, clothing, etc.), we felt that this would be the best site for such a facility," she said.



INTERFAITH'S NEW HELP CENTER

On Wednesday, November 13, all local pastors or prayer warriors are invited to Interfaith's New Help Center, located at 421 N.W. 1st St., for coffee at 8:30 a.m., followed by a dedication prayer at 9 a.m. An Open House for Community Partners will be held from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Call Emily at (352) 629-8868 or email Emily.Pozo@iesmarion.org to R.S.V.P. if you plan to attend. Interfaith anticipates opening the center to serve the community the third week of November.

"Our goal for this center is to continue to help as many Marion County households as possible have their basic needs and to assist those experiencing homelessness to regain self-sufficiency and stable housing," Greenway said.

The new 6,400 square feet facility is divided into two departments. The Social Services side will serve individuals who are housed. It will be open Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., close for the lunch hour and reopen from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Services offered include grocery and clothing assistance, work boots for people starting a new job, gas cards for medical appointments out of county, free reading glasses and assistance with government issued ID cards. The Engagement Center side, which will be open Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., will serve individuals who are homeless. Clients who are volunteering or receiving services will be provided lunch in the center and services provided range from showers and clothing to literacy and soft job skills training.

"This space will provide opportunities for homeless individuals to engage in services and volunteerism," she said. "It is designed to give them access to tools they need to change their situation such as computers, phones, a place to get mail and individual case management."

Greenway said Interfaith is relying on other community partners to bring services to the center to eliminate the barrier caused by the lack of transportation for those seeking help. So far, Career Source, The Marion County Literacy Council, Zero Hour Life Center, Brothers Keepers and the Joint Office of Homelessness outreach team will be providing services at the center, but she hopes other agencies will partner with them.

"Each individual will be met where they are and given the help they need to gain employment or obtain disability benefits for which they qualify, with the ultimate goal of becoming housed," she said. "By bringing services to this one central location, the homeless will not be tasked with going from location to location, most times on foot, to piece together the critical services they need."

Greenway said they need volunteers that can give any amount of time on a regular basis. Volunteers can apply on their website at **www.iesmarion.org.** They also need in-kind donations of soap, razors, shampoo, deodorant, sunscreen, antibiotic ointment, insect repellent, rain ponchos, umbrellas and gently used clothing.



"Individuals have sat on the sides of our streets without hope for too long," Greenway said. "In gency partnership with the other agencies who can help this population, Interfaith hopes to change lives for the better."

VOTE AS IF YOUR LIFE DEPENDS ON IT BECAUSE IT DOES!

Earlene Collins gets really excited during election time. When she was younger, she worked nonstop to encourage people to vote, and now she's not letting anything silence her voice.

"I believe we should feel obligated to vote," she said. "Particularly when you know our history."

As a young adult working at Martin Marietta, she said the International United Auto Workers (UAW) encouraged everyone to register and vote. But before becoming a member of the UAW, Collins, who has lived most of her life in Ocala, said she didn't understand the significance of voting, and she's unsure if her family voted before she became active.

"I became a registered voter in 1973 and have not missed a voting cycle since then," she said. "Since that time, I have encouraged everyone I know to vote."

The 2024 Presidential Election on Tuesday, November 5, is said to be one of the closes races in history. Polls open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., and Early Voting ends on Saturday, November 2, at 6 p.m.

Electing a new president is not the only decision voters will make during this election. The ballot includes six Amendments to the State Constitution:

- 1. Partisan School Board Elections
- 2. Constitutional Right to Fish & Hunt
- 3. Marijuana Use for Adults
- 4. Constitutional Right to an Abortion Before Viability or to Protect the Patient's Health
- 5. Annual Inflation Adjustment for Homestead Exemption
- Repeal of Public Financing for Statewide Candidates who Agree with Spending Limits

In addition to deciding if several Supreme Court Justices and Fifth District Court of Appeal Judges should be retained, voters will also decide on a County Referendum, which, if approved, would extend the existing 1% sales tax for 20 years to improve roadway and public safety infrastructure, and a School Board Referendum that would levy a one-half cent sales tax for 10 years to expand, improve and construct schools, including eligible public charter schools.

Collins said she always took her neighbors to vote, worked to get out the vote, worked the phone banks and encouraged her church family to vote. She also helped several felons gain their rights back so they could cast their vote.

Our freedom is on the line," Collins said. "We can't go back!"


Junior Sunshine Parade

MONEY SMART TIPS

ONE DEGREE CAN MAKE A BIG DIFFERENCE!

You might have heard this question before: What difference does one degree make? At 211 degrees water does not boil, at 212 degrees it does. When traveling by plane, for every one degree you are off course you will be one mile off course after flying just 60 miles. When it comes to money one degree can also make a difference. With winter coming soon if you turn down your thermostat just one degree, you can reduce your heating costs between 1 and 3 percent. It is also easier for your system to



operate at this lower heating temperature which can mean lower maintenance and repair costs. An easy way to do this and stay comfortable is to layer in the daytime, an extra sweater or add a tee shirt under your shirt and at night just add an extra blanket. I wonder if you will even notice the difference between 68 and 67 degrees. Want to really save money, drop it two degrees below your normal setting. In summer months keep your home one or two degrees warmer than usual but wear lighter clothing and use fans which are very energy efficient. Again, you might stay just as comfortable while saving some money.



For 17 years Emory "Sly Guy" Schley wrote a column for the Ocala Star-Banner. Emory sadly passed away in 2021 but many of you remember his articles were more like a conversation with his readers. I recall an ongoing group of stories where the discussion was about the high cost of coffee. Emory's challenge to his readers was to reduce,

just slightly, the amount of coffee you use when making a cup and see if you notice any difference in taste. If you don't then reduce it just a little bit more. Many readers reduced the coffee they were using by half without giving up the taste they enjoyed. I wonder what other items we use on a regular basic could benefit from this "just a tiny bit less" practice? Perhaps a tad less detergent in your washing machine. Notice any difference in your clothes? A little less shampoo when you wash your hair? I am sure you can think of other items you can try this with but the point is by reducing as many items as possible by just a very small amount you could end up saving a good amount of money every month. Now multiple this by 12 and see how much you can save in a year.

If you are a homeowner with a mortgage, you might have noticed that mortgage rates have finally come down. The expectation is that there will be one or two more rate cuts before the end of this calendar year. Since there is a cost when refinancing, U. S. News & World Report suggests refinancing only when you know you are going to stay in the home for more than a few years. They also write that you should only refinance if the new rate will lower your old rate by 2 percent or more. With falling rates, if you have been saving money by investing in CD's their advice is if you have some extra money, lock in the higher rates now before they get cut again.

I hope you have been taking my advice and have been doing your Christmas shopping a little bit each month. Now you can start checking each store's return policy as many will allow you to buy something now and with their extended return timeline you can return it after the holidays. If your store does this now you can start buying clothing and shoes when you see a great sale knowing that if they don't fit or aren't liked the person you are buying for can still return it without a problem. The goal is to spread out your bills over a number of months so you don't get those killer bills all at once in late December or January.
